## TIPS TO KEEP IN MIND

Remember, while this guide offers specific strategies for each hole, certain principles apply across the entire course. Keep these universal tips in mind to enhance your overall game and enjoy your round:

- **The ball is round for a reason. Play to let it roll out.** Utilize the natural contours of the course to maximize your distance and positioning. Don't be afraid to let your ball run.
- **Allow gravity to be your partner.** The course is designed with subtle slopes and undulations. Trust these features to guide your ball, and you'll often find yourself in better positions.
- **It's not as scary as it looks. Like most great designs, most of the challenge is between your ears.** Approach each shot with confidence and a clear mind. The course's visual challenges can be more daunting than the actual physical obstacles. Trust your abilities and enjoy the mental game.

More than anything, enjoy your round!

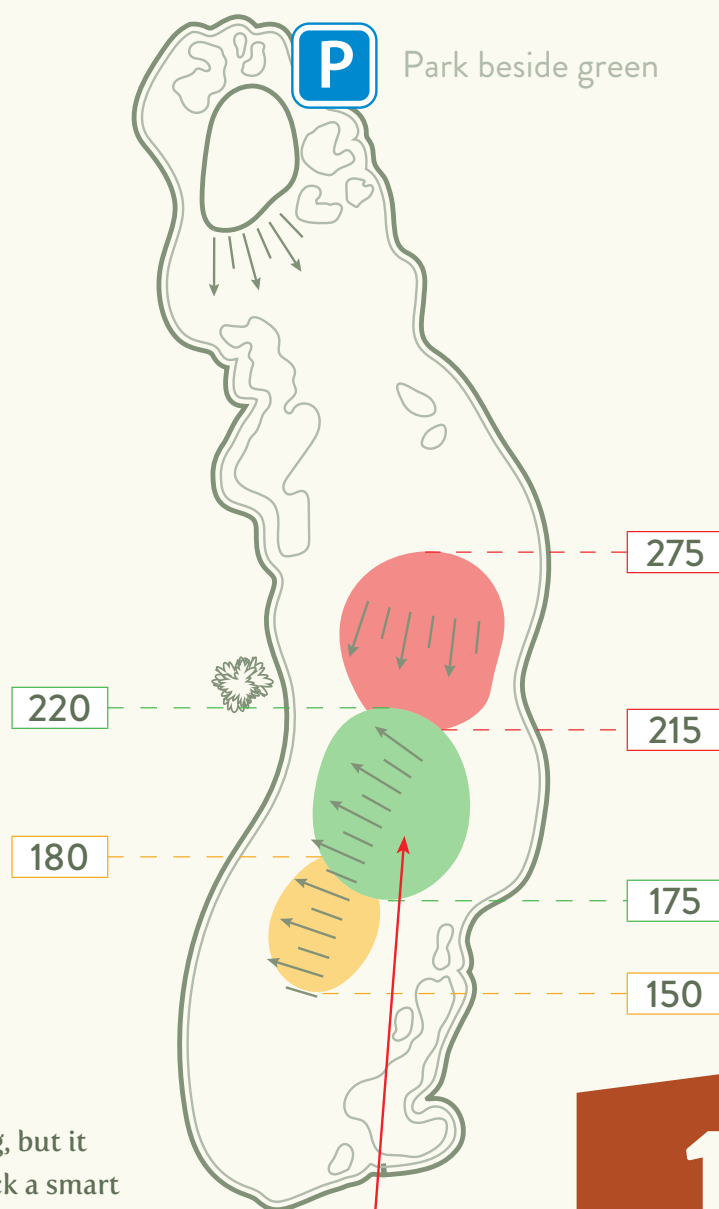

This hole looks demanding, but it really just wants you to pick a smart line, trust the slope, and not force anything. Aim down the right side off the tee and commit. There's plenty of room, and shots finishing left of center often pick up a little extra run.

The approach plays longer than it looks. The green sits up and has a real false front, so gravity is your enemy here. Anything short comes straight back. Take enough club to fly the ball fully onto the surface and aim to land past the middle.

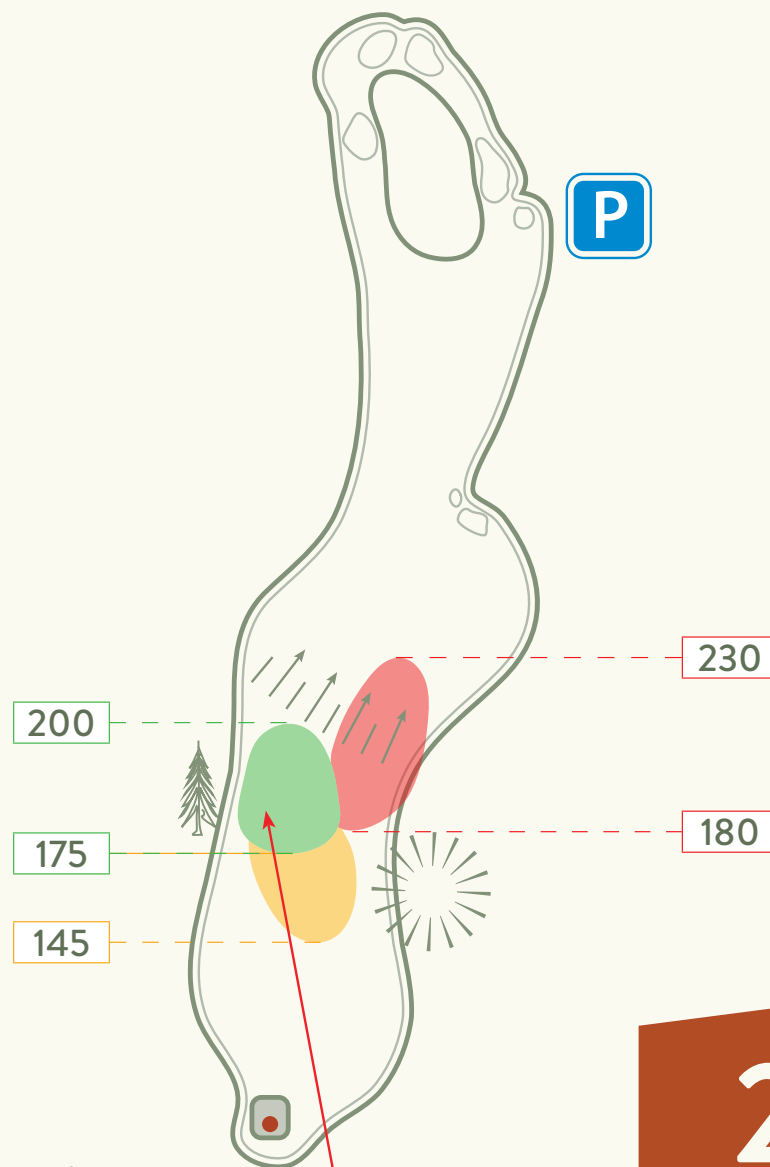

The tee shot asks you to be disciplined. Choose a club you trust to reach the top of the hill and aim just right of the evergreen. If you crest it, the slope will take care of the rest.

The green slopes left to right and has a sneaky false front. Favor the high side and make sure the ball carries fully onto the putting surface. Short shots are punished more than you expect.

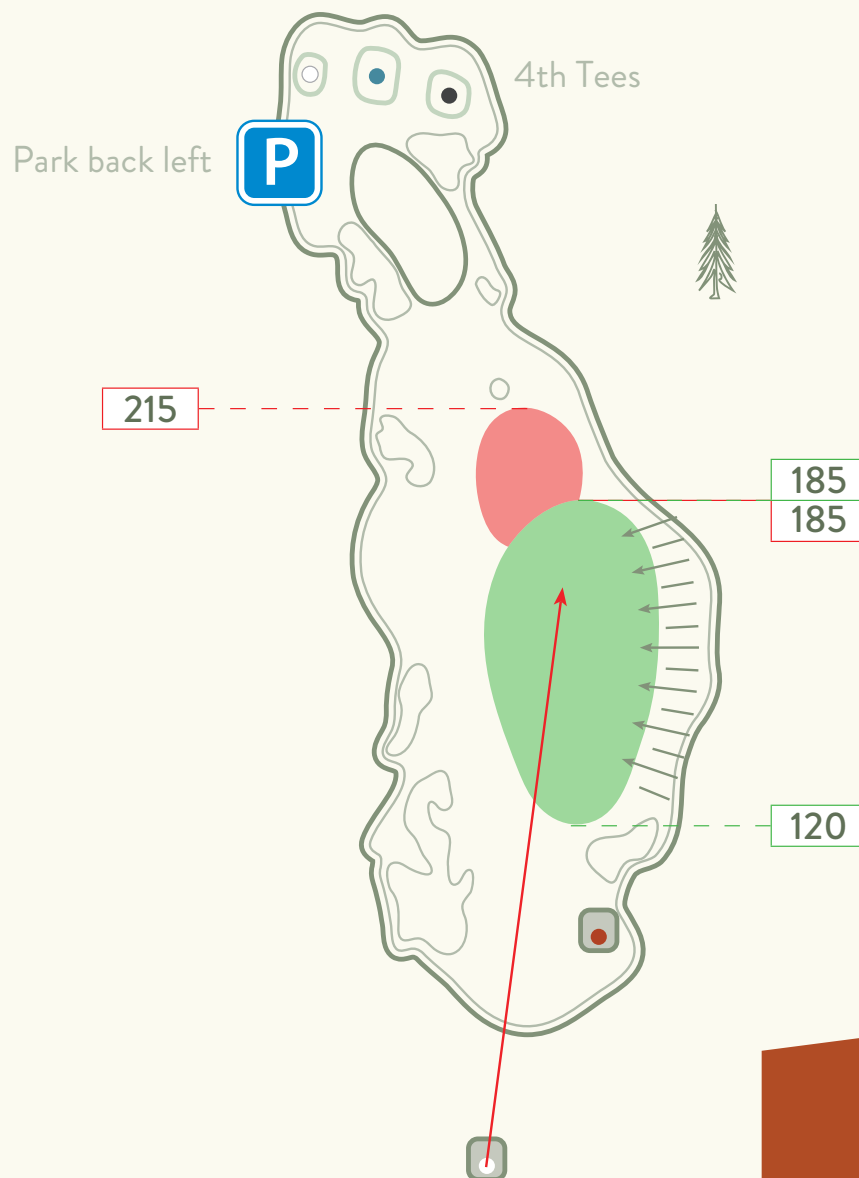

This hole rewards starting the ball on the correct side. Aim down the right half of the fairway and let the tilt bring the ball back toward the middle.

On the approach, position matters. Shots from the right side open up the green. Everything moves right to left on the surface, so favor the high side and let the ball release naturally.

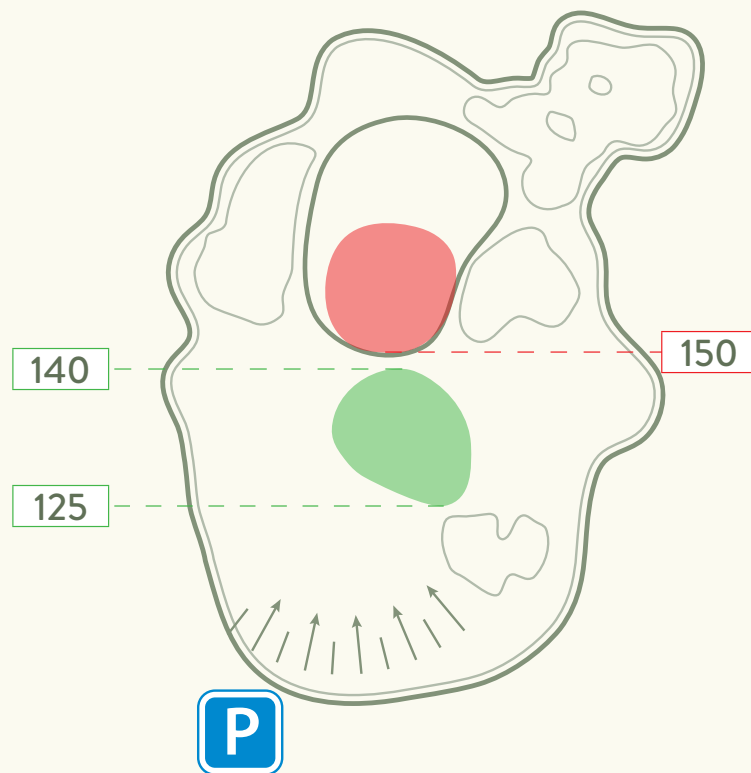

A downhill par 3 that usually plays less club, but wind always matters here.

The smartest play is landing the ball short of the green and letting the slope feed it on. Shots flown directly onto the surface tend to run through and leave tricky recoveries.

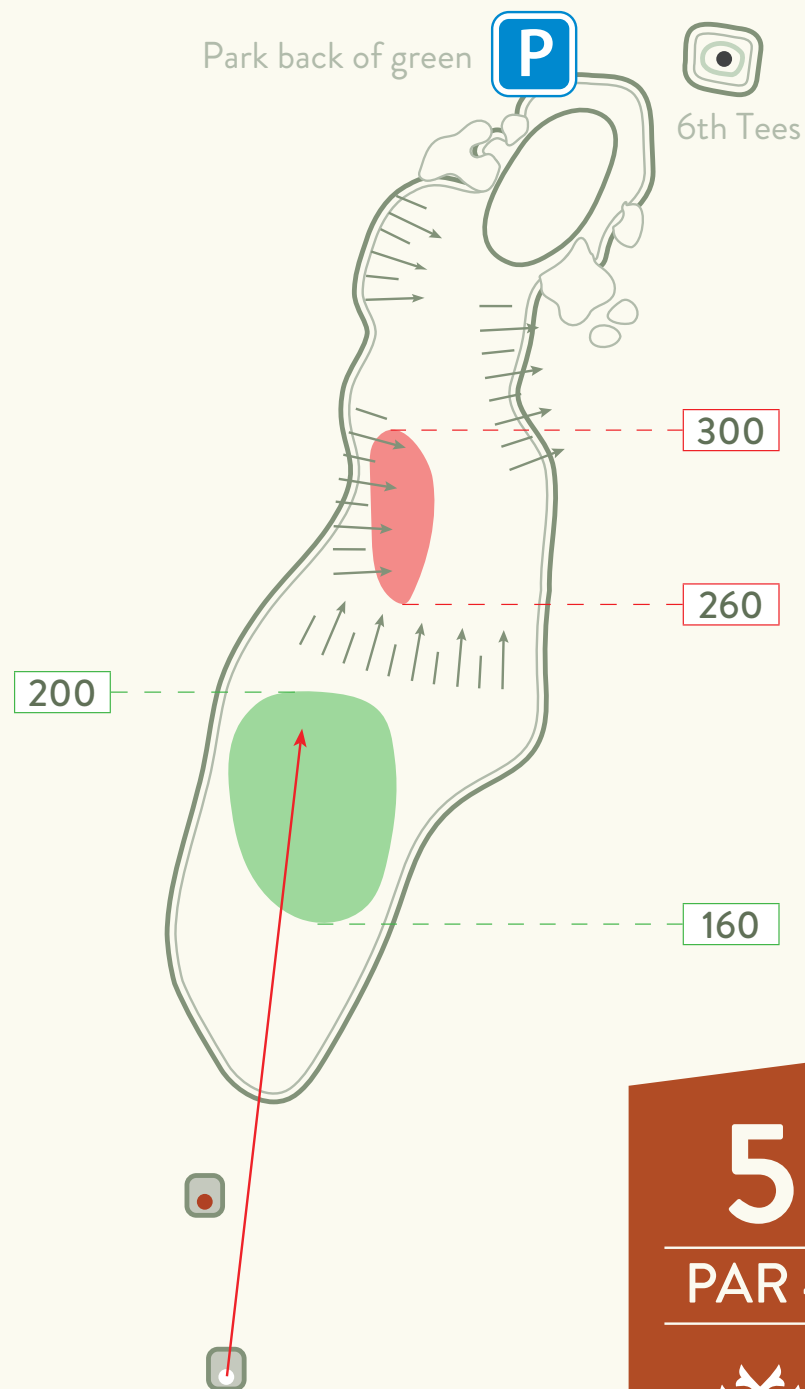

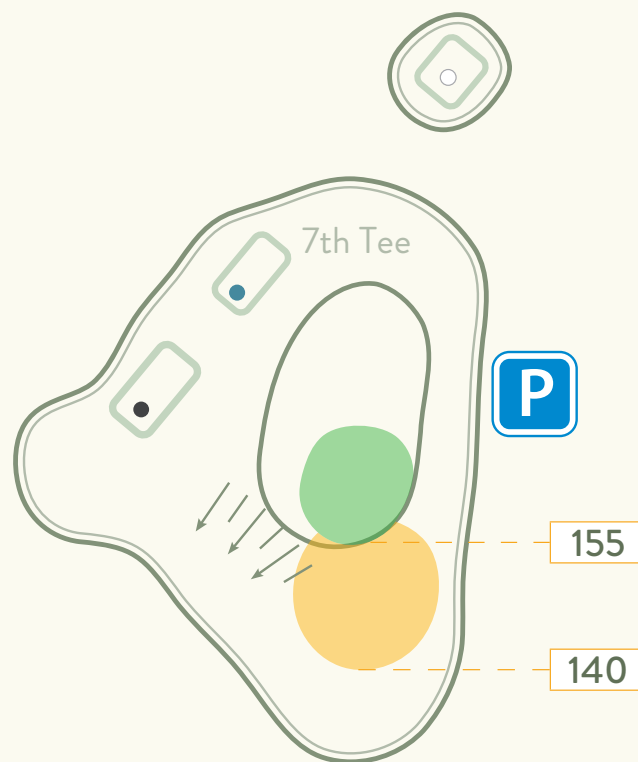
This is a demanding par 4 that rewards patience. Favor the left side of the fairway and resist trying to do too much off the tee.

From the plateau, let the approach use the natural contour. Shots landing short and slightly left often get a helpful bounce toward the green.

This hole presents a generous target, but it still wants thoughtful execution. Know your number and trust it.

Landing the ball on the front portion of the green is ideal. Shots struck too firmly can release over the back. Putting from below the hole makes this green much easier.

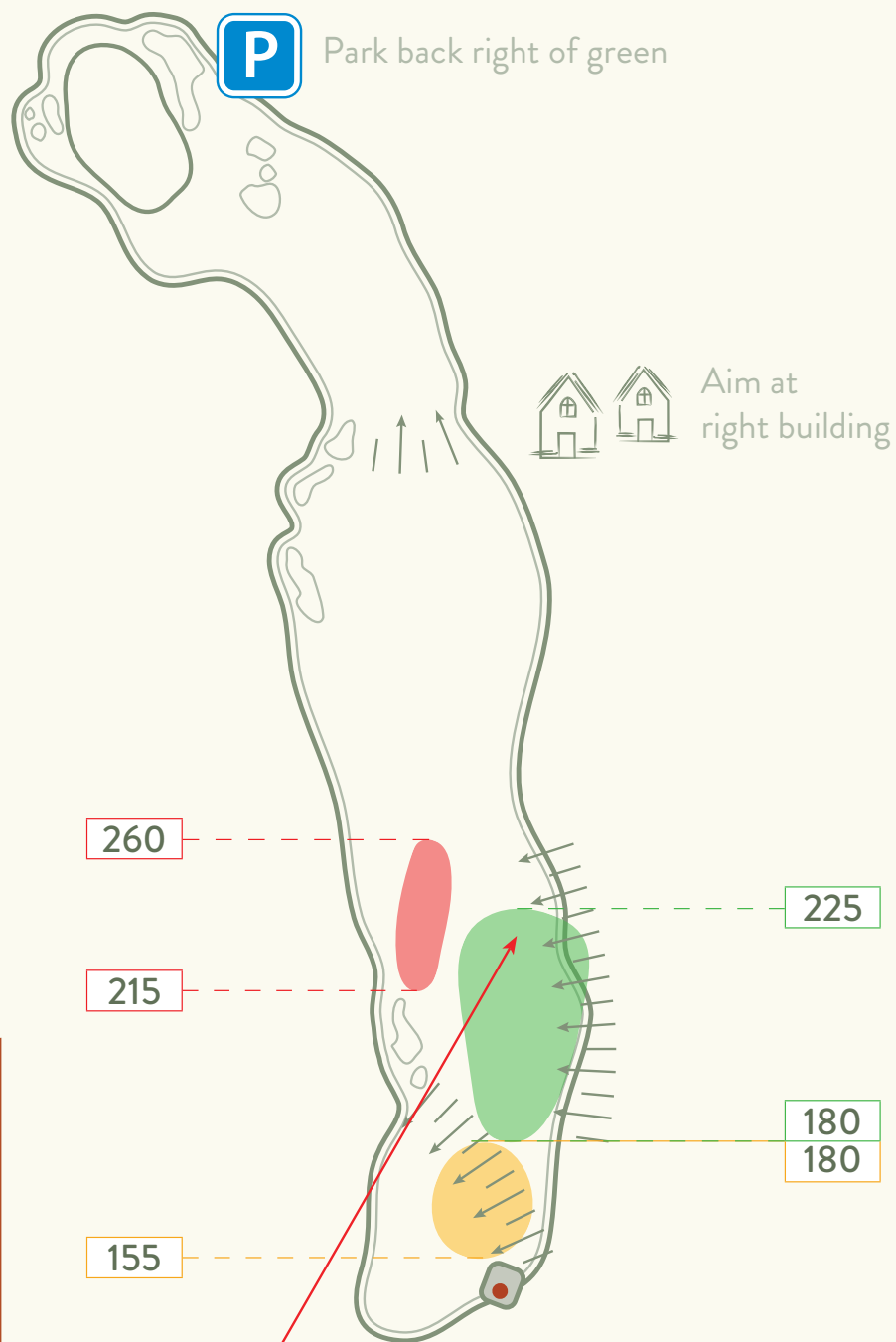

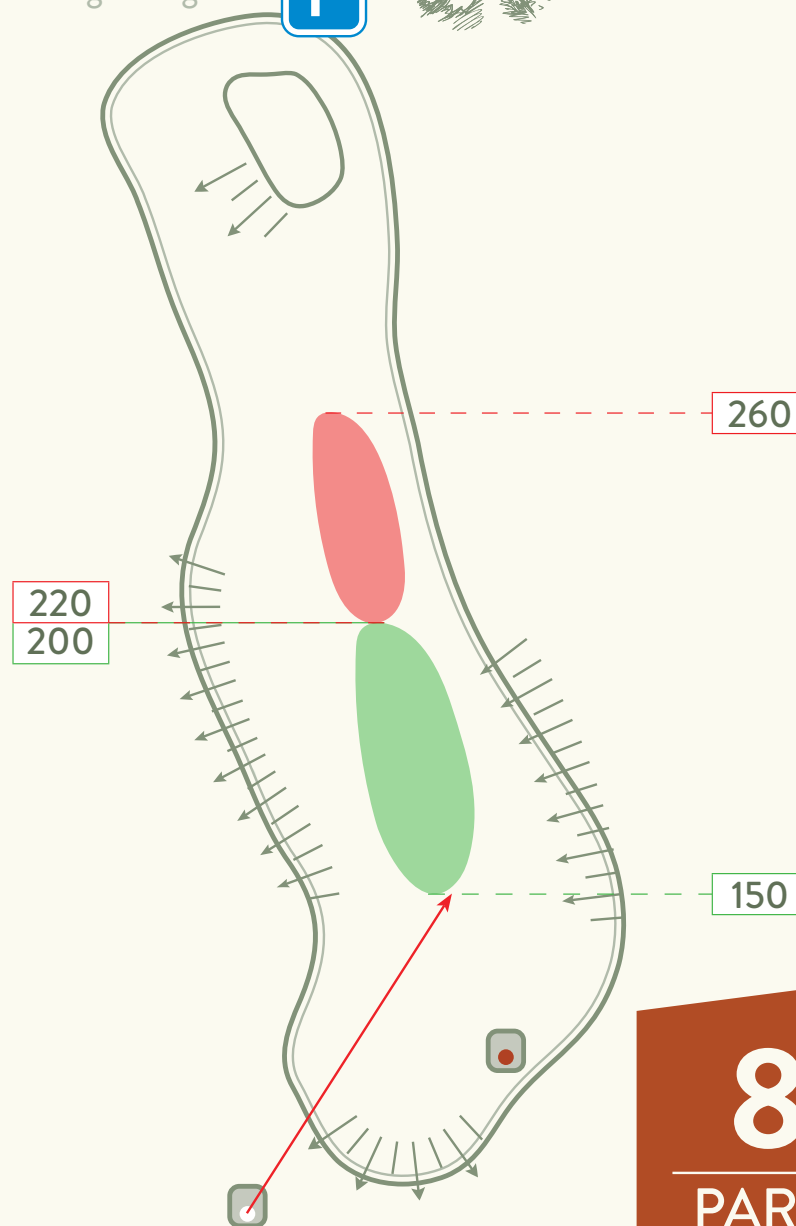

An uphill tee shot to start adds more bite than it appears. Aim down the right side and let the slope feed the ball back toward the center.

From there, this hole plays best as a three-shot plan. Lay up to a comfortable number and let the approach use the downslope to feed toward the green.

Park back right of green



The tee shot is blind, but there's plenty of room. Trust the alignment posts, commit to your swing, and don't steer it.

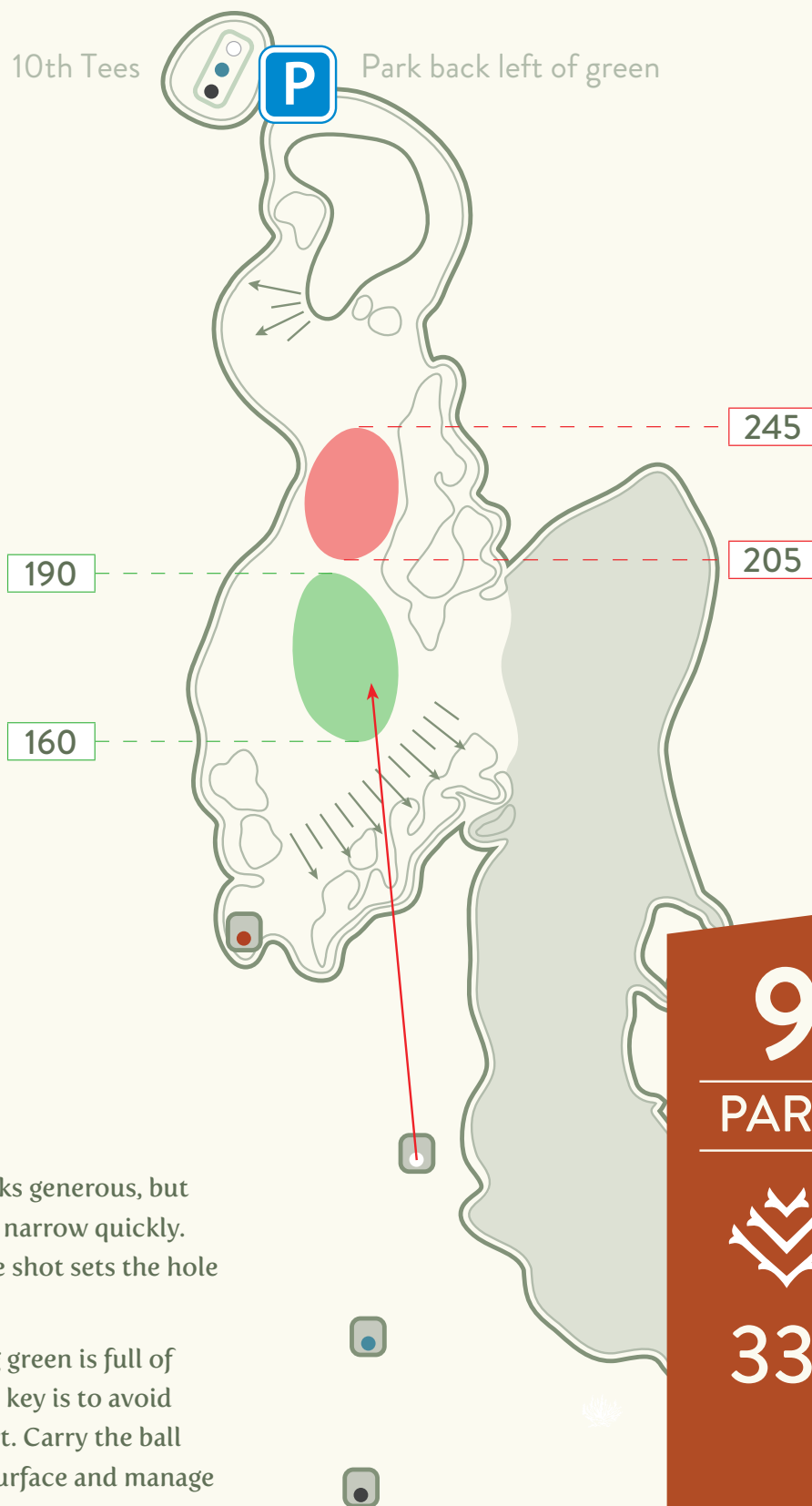
The approach demands discipline. The green falls sharply left with a steep runoff. Favor the high side and accept a longer putt — missing low leads to difficult recoveries.

The fairway looks generous, but aggressive lines narrow quickly. A controlled tee shot sets the hole up properly.

The boomerang green is full of movement. The key is to avoid coming up short. Carry the ball fully onto the surface and manage the putt from there.



Take a moment to enjoy the view, then refocus. With the elevation drop, this hole often plays less club, though wind can change the decision.

Pin-high shots are rewarded. Misses long or short bring immediate challenges, so distance control is critical.

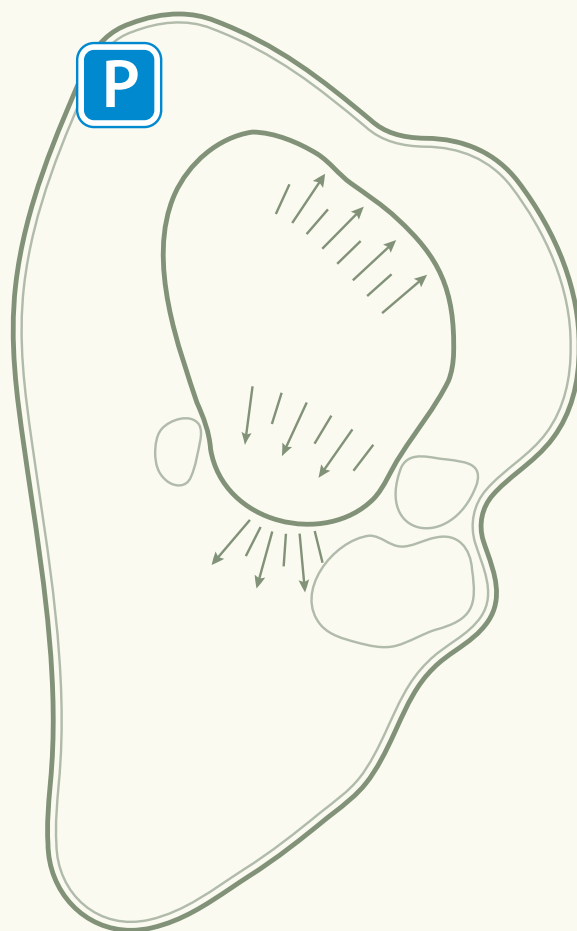

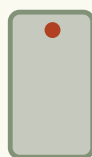
This hole offers a clear decision off the tee. A safer line to the middle of the fairway leaves a longer but level second shot.

The approach plays uphill to a green with a false front. Take an extra club and commit — anything short will roll back.



A compact par 3 that usually plays slightly longer than the number.

The green is distinctly tiered. Choose the correct section and land the ball there. Being on the wrong tier makes even relatively short putts difficult.

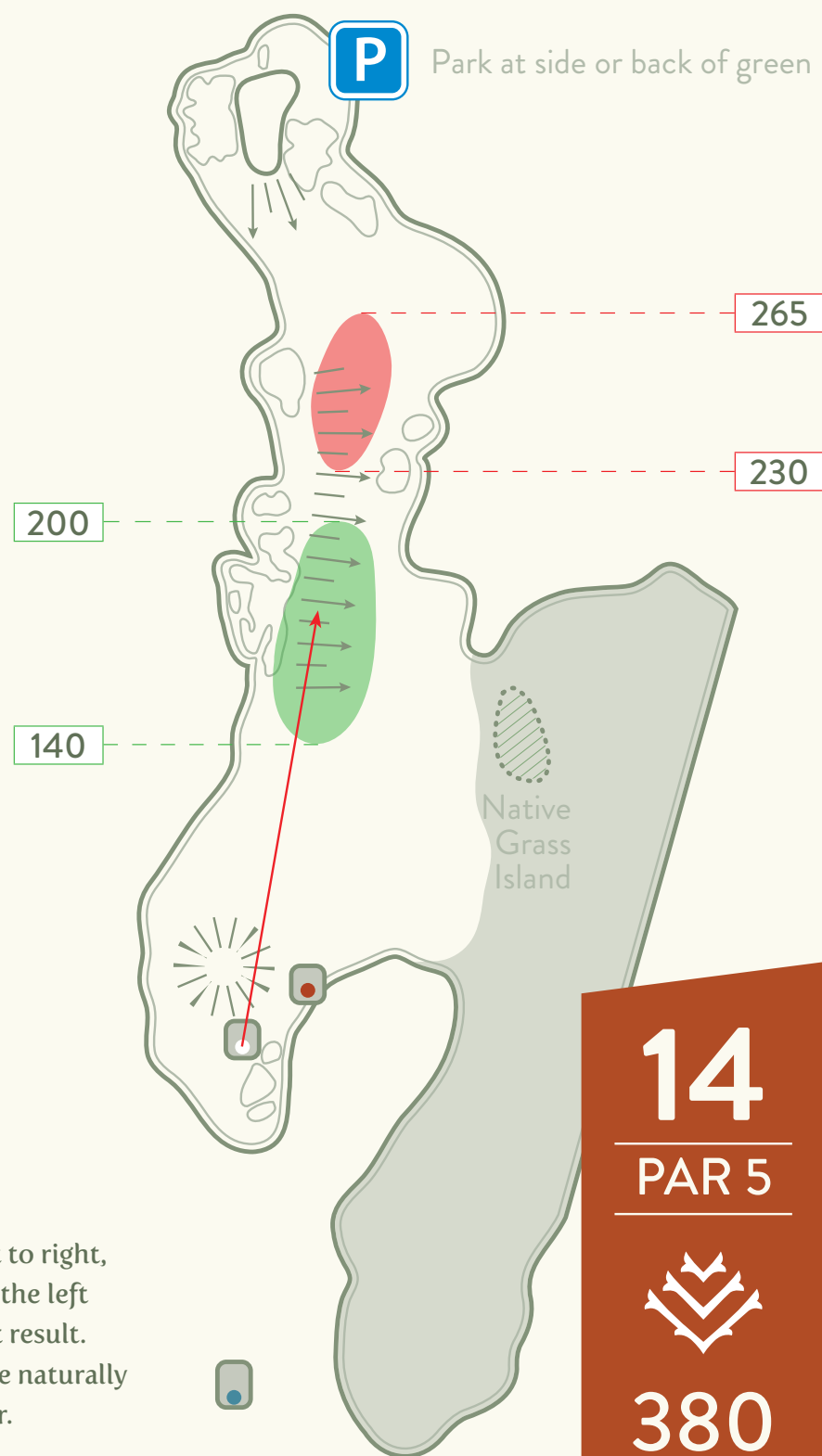

This drivable par 4 invites confidence, but commitment matters. Favor the left side if you're being aggressive – the contours help there.

If you choose to lay back, pick a comfortable yardage and hit a full wedge. Half-decisions tend to get punished.



The fairway slopes left to right, so starting the ball on the left side produces the best result. Tee shots landing there naturally feed toward the center.

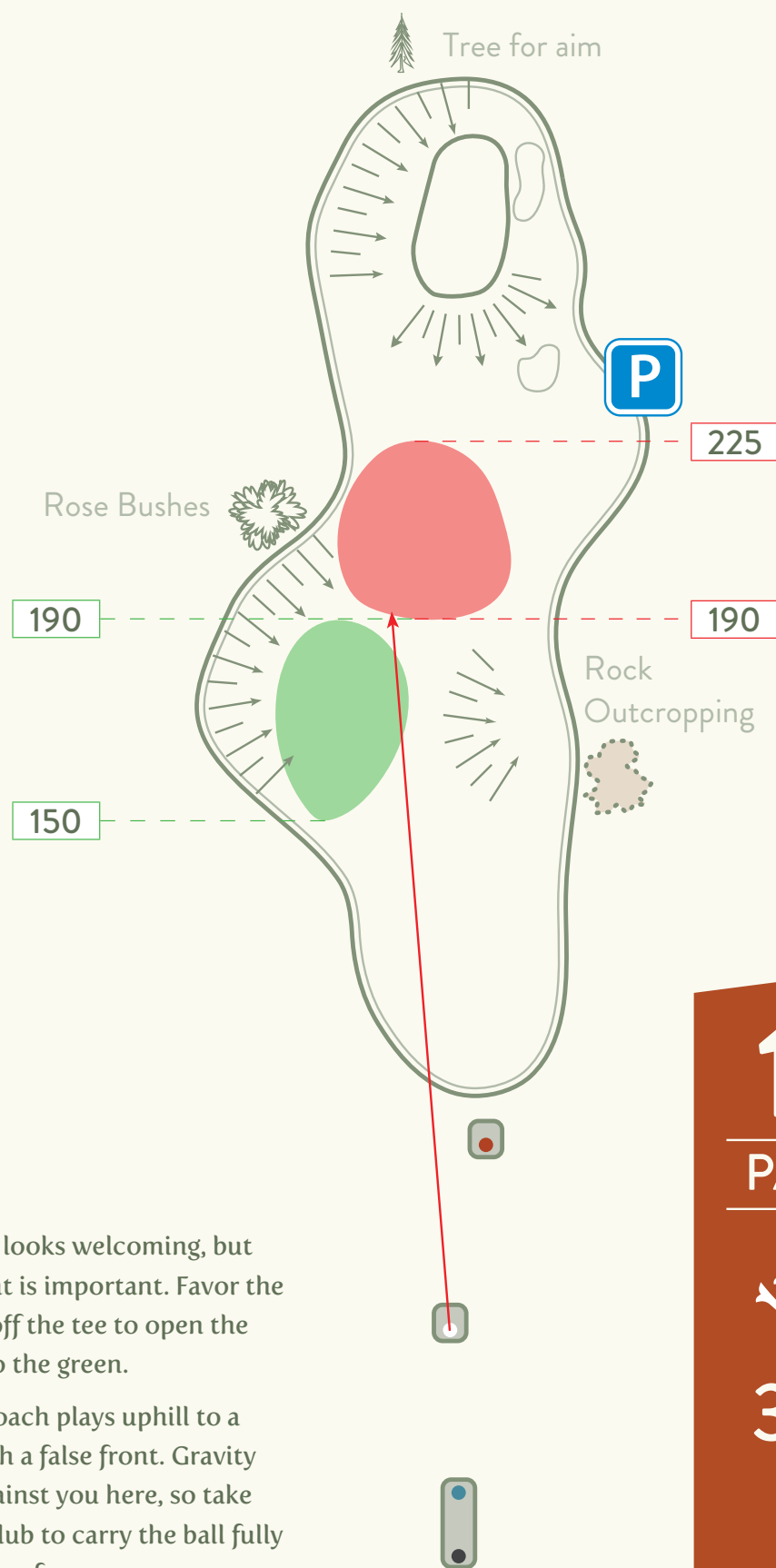
The approach plays slightly uphill. Add a touch of club and swing smoothly. The left greenside bunker is a safe miss.

This hole looks welcoming, but placement is important. Favor the left side off the tee to open the angle into the green.

The approach plays uphill to a green with a false front. Gravity works against you here, so take enough club to carry the ball fully onto the surface.

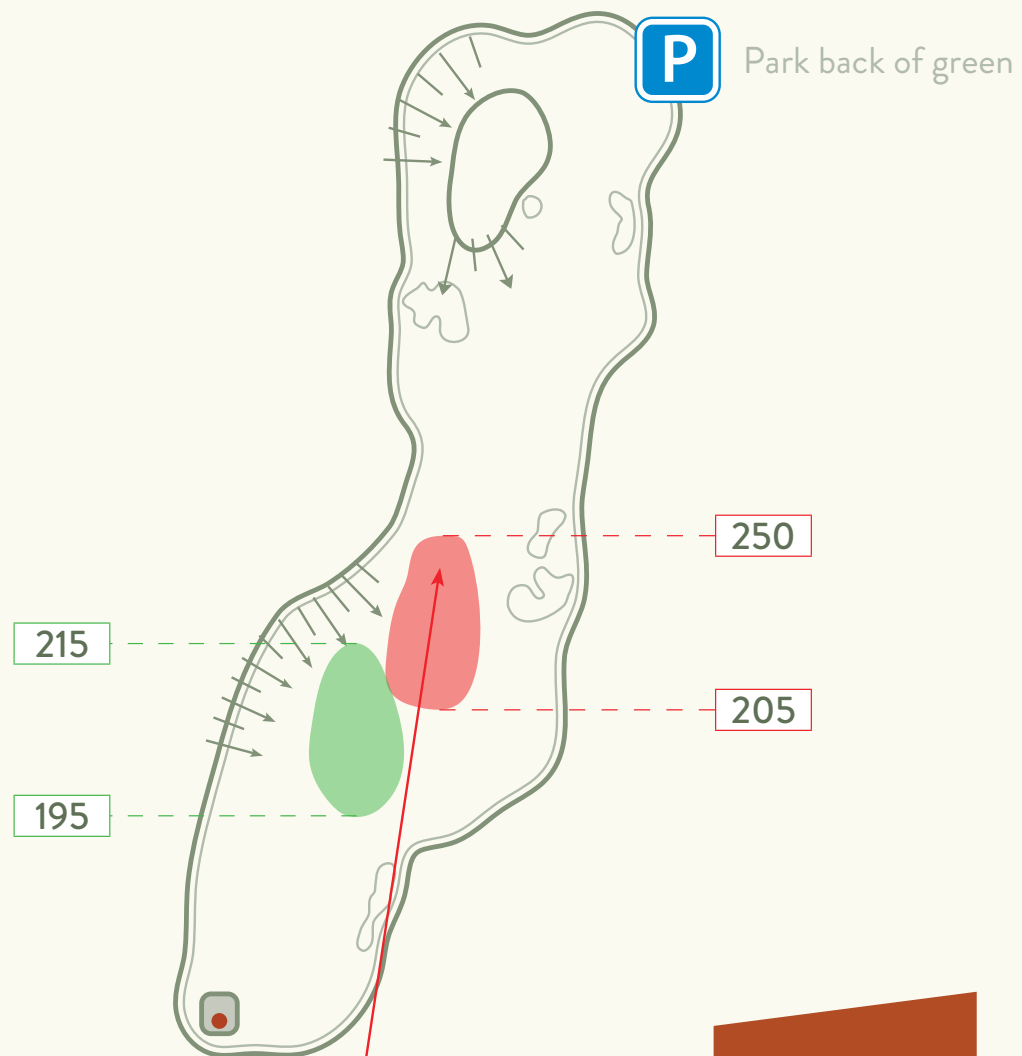

A strong finishing hole that rewards discipline. The fairway slopes left to right, so starting the ball on the left allows the ground to bring it back to center.

The green is shallow, making precision essential. Playing to the center of the surface is always a smart way to finish.
